## A MESSAGE FROM MAYOR GIBSON

Hello all,

Things have been quite busy since I last spoke to you in our December newsletter. County Council has had its inaugural meeting; Council committees have been struck and have had their initial meetings in January, County council had a two day Council orientation session, the County has had its budget workshop and at the January 28 meeting the 2015 County budget of \$38,697,229 was passed. County department staffs were directed to not exceed a 2% levy increase and they did that.

The County payment to MPAC this year is \$1,514,289. This is a 0.95% increase over 2014 and the same increase will apply in 2016. The County covers the

#### Role of Head of Council

Depending on your municipality, the head of council may be called a warden, chair, reeve, or mayor. Whatever title is preferred, the role of head of council as set out by the Municipal Act, 2001 remains the same.

MPAC costs for all lower tier Municipalities as well as the FCM annual fees which were \$12,419, a 2.1% increase over 2014. The City of Pembroke is the



only municipality in the County not a member of the County Council but they will consider rejoining the County in the near future.

I serve on the Property and Development and on the Social Services committees. These committees meet monthly and prepare detailed reports and resolutions to be presented at the monthly County Council meetings.

Our own Council is reviewing our procedural bylaw to make any necessary changes. At our inaugural meeting we changed the name of the head of Council to Mayor from Reeve to better reflect understanding of the position so that is one of the changes that will be reflected in the revised bylaw.

We are trying to get by with only one meeting per month. This should save

some staff preparation time and will naturally result in longer Council meetings.

Your Council has passed the 2015 tax by-law with a slight decrease in Municipal taxes over last year. We don't know yet what the education tax rate will be but if you believe the rumors from Queen's Park, it shouldn't be much different than last year.

This January I was appointed to serve on the Deep River and District Hospital Foundation Board and look forward to our first meeting this February.

In January I attended a two day strategic planning retreat sponsored by the Deep River and District Hospital Board to help formulate the strategic direction for the hospital for the next five years.

Your recreation committee has been hard at work and has a full slate of activities for this year so I encourage everyone to attend these activities and enjoy the company of your friends and neighbors. I want to take this opportunity to thank our municipal staff and all of our volunteers for their efforts in making this community a truly great place to live. It would be a pretty dull place without your contributions.

That's all for now folks. Enjoy the winter and thanks for reading this newsletter.

### DEEP RIVER AND AREA FOOD BANK

Another service available to HCM residents is the Deep River and Area Food Bank. The food bank is located in the basement area of the Deep River & District Hospital at 117 Banting Drive in Deep River. Go to the far east end of the building and you will see their sign on an

entry door.

The Food Bank is open Monday from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. (except when Monday is a holiday).

Clients may make one visit per month and will be required to provide the following information:

- ⇒ Name, address and phone number
- ⇒ Number of children and years of birth (to provide extra's such as lunch kits)
- ⇒ Partner's name (if any)
- ⇒ ID with address for the first visit of each year.

To contact the Food Bank you can visit Mondays during their open hours or call 613-584-2484 and leave a message. Messages are reviewed daily and someone will get back to you.

### TRAILER PARKING FOR SLEDDERS

As determined in 2013, Municipal staff allow for parking of vehicles and trailers along municipal roads at certain locations along Mackey Creek and Ashport Roads. The snowplow turnarounds are already plowed as widely as possible in these areas for this purpose, vehicles parking there are not ticketed provided they park where indicated.



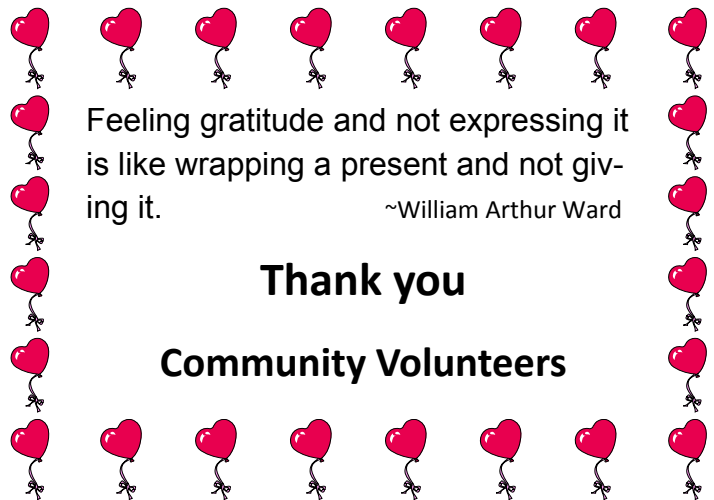
So long as people park their vehicles along the left side of the road, the left side while traveling in the road (the south side of Mackey Creek Road and the north side of Ashport Road) they are OK. They will not be ticketed, towed or plowed in.

### MUNICIPAL REMINDERS

#### SNOW ON MUNICIPAL ROADS

Township bylaws and the Highway Traffic Act prohibit parking or stopping on a road in a way that interferes with plowing operations. Plow operators need clear roadways to complete their routes safely and on time. Under the Highway Traffic Act, residents are prohibited from depositing snow on any roadway. When clearing snow, pile it on your property – do not shovel it onto the road or across the road into the ditch. This practice is dangerous because it may cover the salt/sand applied and may cause drivers to lose control. It may also cause windrows of snow that freeze across the road causing further hazards.

ble, quick-dry bed mats which provide an alternative to sleeping on the damp, hard ground. Medical teams in Haiti found them invaluable.”

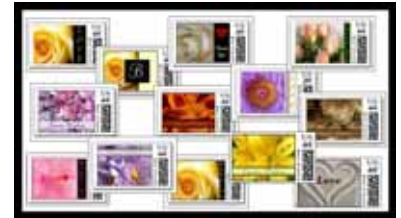
The milk bags are also crocheted into strong, waterproof Tote bags. We use the colourful outer milk bag which holds the three smaller clear bags inside. We also recycle all of our extra plastic bags into plastic wood.

The bags collected here at the Municipal hall are delivered to Mackenzie Community School in Deep River. If you buy milk by the 3 litre bag please, save us your bags and drop off, when you come to pay your taxes, when you visit the library or just stop in and we will be pleased to take them off your hands.

## Saving Stamps!!

Recently I received a thank you from “ Effect Hope” The Leprosy Mission in Canada. Our community of HCM had been bringing in stamps to our collection for about a year and I had finally taken them home and trimmed them to the desired size and mailed them off.



The letter thanked us for this gift, as they then take the used stamps and sell them to stamp collectors and Effect Hope receives money for their cause, eliminating Leprosy. They need a pound of stamps to earn \$9.00 and in 2013 raised \$14,500. They are now trying to raise \$12,000 in 2014. Next (2015) year’s goal is unknown.

So I would like to thank everyone for bringing their old stamps in for this collection and encourage others to do the same. The side benefit of this collection is another item that does not end up in our landfill and although it does not seem like a lot, keep in mind every little bit adds up.



If you wish to bring the envelopes in whole I will trim to the correct size or you can just tear them in half and leave for me to trim. If you wish to trim stamps yourself they need to be trimmed to a border of NO less than a ¼” inch all around. Personally I like to try and get closer to a ½” border. Also, if you are in the process of going through old files etc., they would love stamps from letters dated prior to 1950 intact (with the envelope) if possible. Do not trim at all, but drop off the entire envelope to be sent to “Effect Hope”, no trimming needed. (GW)
